DUBLIN, Dec. 6.

The Parliament of this Kingdom which stood Prorogued to Thursday the 6<sup>th</sup> Inst. is further Prorogued to Monday the 17<sup>th</sup> Inst.  
The Roman Catholic Convention have continued their sittings for three days past, but as no person but those immediately belonging to that body are admitted, their proceedings are not made public.  
However, as far as hearsay can be credited, it is but justice to report, that good temper, moderation, and unanimity, have prevailed among them.  
The public should bestow very little attention on the various accounts of tumults in England and Scotland, published in the Opposition prints. When they are closely investigated, they appear to be only the fabrications of designing incendiaries, who thus labour to destroy tranquility on paper.  
The failure of a certain merchant having fractured a chain of connexion among his friends, one or two of them darkened a day or two ago in consequence.  
Here is another pretext for not discounting bills in a certain place at five—but as the public are aware of this money-dealing GO, to bring people to private houses to discount at six—it is high time to drop the Shylock trick.  
An attempt has been made to influence the public mind, by an exaggerated account of an enormous list of Pensions having been lately placed on the establishment for Members of Parliament. The fact is, that a grant of near 8000<sup>l</sup>. a year has been made to his Royal Highness the Duke of York, as a contribution from Ireland to the establishment of a second son of our Sovereign on his marriage; and a few pensions have been granted, but exclusive of the contribution to support the Royal Family, the pension list is considerably decreased since last year.  
Some of the offences to be tried at the Commission, will perhaps, open the eyes of many deluded and ignorant people, who imagine that they may riot in the cause of Anarchy without the danger of punishment.  
We hear, and we trust it is the fact, that a regiment of infantry is to be removed from the barracks to a central situation in the city. Their presence will be an effectual check on the patriotic disturbers of the peace.  
Yesterday the Roman Catholic Delegates continued their sitting in Back-lane. An address to his Majesty was agreed to, and the meeting adjourned to this day.—The Chairman's name we are informed is Barowell.
