For any meeting whattoever of great numbers of people with fuch circumstances of terror, as cannot but endanger the public peace, and raife fears and jealoufies among the King's fubjeets, feems properly to be called an unlawful attembly, as where great numbers, complaining of a common grievance meet together, armed in a warlike manner in order to confult together concerning the most proper means for the recovery of their interests; for no one can forelee what may be the event of fuch an effembly." or how , so downe of yours open
