Art. I. The garrison shall march out with all the honours of war, colours slying, drums beating, matches lighted, with arms, baggage, and their field pieces, consisting of three brass fix-pounders, and two three-pounders, their waggons and ammunition. Every man shall have fixty shot to fire, and the garrison be allowed two days, after the figning of the prefect capitulation, to evacuate the citadel.— Granted; with the restriction that the garrison shall march out to-morrow the 30th with the honours of war, shall be formed in order of

Art. II. This garrison shall be then conducted into the barracks in the city, where they shall remain until their departure, the necessary precautions for their safety being taken on both sides. Granted; so far as relates to the delay of two days after the signing of the present capitulation for the evacuation of the citadel.

The baggage of the officers and other persons of the garrison shall not be pillaged, and they shall be furnished with carriages and horses, necessary for their conveyance to the army of his Royal Highness the Duke of Saxe Teschen.
