The continued rains for some time past, has had an extraordinary effect on a large Bog, at Portenard, near Bilboa, in this County, the property of the Rev. Richard Lloyd; several acres of which on Saturday night removed into an adjoining river, carrying with it a number of Cattle which were destroyed;—unhappily some poor Families, whose Cottages were near the Bog, have experienced a similar fate, the exact number that has perished, has not yet been ascertained.

That every person must feel horror at the idea of premature Burials is generally allowed;—but how, it may be questioned can this shocking evil be remedied—the answer is obvious; let Government adopt the simple mode as practised in England, viz. the appointing of Persons in each Parish under the description of Searchers, who are called upon by the proprietor of every House where a Corpse may be, and who must give a Certificate that putrefaction has taken place, and the person died a natural death, before it can be interred.

A Correspondent, who has a number of children, thinks it may not be improper to observe, at this season, that if youth were examined during Vacation by persons eminent for learning, (at the instance of their Parents) it would produce a much happier effect than the public Examinations at Academies, which too frequently happens are conducted with partiality, and even deception.
