but happily it took no effect. One of the
officers, who was in his barrack, pursued them,
and hindered any further mischief, by bringing
them in custody to Alderman Reed, who was
at that time in the aisle of Christ Church,
where he had the men who began the riot,
prisoners. The Alderman then sent for a
party of horse and foot, and conveyed them
all to the barrack.
