But as to the Parliament, be muft refift the attempt to alienate from them the aflections of three millions of the people : When delt the Catholic Petition was presented, there was not a man who even professed an expectation that the measures would then be carried; they professed a wish for no more than that the cars of Protestants should be familiarized to their claims, and a hope that reason and justice wau'd have their effect, after that deliberation which to great a lubject required. The Petition was not rejected on the principles that their claims were madmillible; the very contrary of the principle was flated, and among others in was flated by himfelf. What was more right, or more natural, or more fuited to the dignity of Parliament, than that on lo great a quefthey should confer with their Constituents, and take time for deliberation; the refult of that deliberation, he trulled would be a great and fubitantial messure, granting them at once every thing, except what would appear injurous to thole of both perluations. A twelvemonth, the utual time for a Roman Catholic Candidate to declare his pretentions to an office, was not a very long time for them to wait before their pretenhous, great and general as they were, fliould be decided upon, nor for us to deliberate, before we revited the policy of our ancestors. Our fivation required two things-Armament and Union-we were prohably at the eve of a war, and with a people, by which this part of the British Empire alone appeared to be vulnerable. In England, in the Eaft or in the West Indies, the French Republic cannot hope to make any impression: Whether it can make one in Ireland, depends upon ourfelves and upon our union, and we require s continued preparation against them. They have disclaimed the Treaties by which they were bound; they have declared war against all conflicted authorities, and have openly avowed that they will espoule the cause of the populace in every country against the government. The principle on which they would extend their dominion is not new in hittory, it
