

and proposed a Militia, (and he trusted they would propose an effectual and a constitutional one) they at least shewed something like conscious innocence, for they offered to place efficient power into the hands of the people; they seemed to resemble that King of Syracuse, who, when accused of tyranny, desired his people to hear him *in arms*, that they might feel their power at the same time that they exercised their judgment. But as to the Parliament, he must resist the attempt to alienate from them the affections of three millions of the people: When the Catholic Petition was presented, there was not a man who even professed an expectation that the measures would then be carried; they professed a wish for no more than that the ears of Protestants should be familiarized to their claims, and a hope that reason and justice would have their effect, after that deliberation which so great a subject required. The Petition was not rejected on the principles that their claims were inadmissible; the very contrary of the principle was stated, and among others it was stated by himself. What was more right, or more natural, or more suited to the dignity of Parliament, than that on so great a question they should confer with their Constituents, and take time for deliberation; the result of that deliberation, he trusted would be a great and substantial measure, granting them at once every thing, except what would appear injurious to those of both persuasions. A twelve-month, the usual time for a Roman Catholic Candidate to declare his pretensions to an office, was not a very long time for them to wait before their pretensions, great and general as they were, should be decided upon, nor for us to deliberate, before we revised the policy of our ancestors. Our situation required two things—Armament and Union—we were probably at the eve of a war, and with a people, by which this part of the British Empire alone appeared to be vulnerable. In England, in the East or in the West Indies, the French Republic cannot hope to make any impression: Whether it can make one in Ireland, depends upon ourselves and upon our union, and we require a continued preparation against them. They have disclaimed the Treaties by which they were bound; they have declared war against all constituted authorities, and have openly avowed that they will espouse the cause of the populace in every country against the government. The principle on which they would extend their dominion is not new in history, it is exactly the principle of what was called the *Albanan Empire*.

My Right Hon. Friend ascribes the present discontents to the rejection of measures proposed by opposition. To common observation those discontents seem to arise from very different causes, and for these six months, I think, they have scarcely been mentioned in a single publication; but if he thinks that the stale recollection of them has left a sting behind it, I submit it to him whether it be judicious to give new force to discontent, by dwelling on them with such pointed severity, much less should gentlemen endeavour to influence the Catholic body against the Parliament. He thought it would be right to withdraw the amendment, as some Gentlemen did not wish to pledge themselves on the Catholic question, or his part he made up his mind on that subject.

Mr. *Sheridan* in an able and eloquent speech (of which we have not room this day) supported the Address.

Several other Gentlemen spoke in the debate: their speeches we intend to give in a future paper. The question for the Address having passed unanimously, about 11 o'clock at night the House Adjourned; and on
