It was yesterday reported, with much confidence, that the French army, under the command of General Miranda, had been totally defeated by General Clairfait, near Treves.—Letters by the mail this morning from Frankfurt, dated the 12th January, state that at that time nothing fresh had happened between the troops under General Custine and the Combined Armies.

The last Brussels Gazette contains an article from Stockholm, of date, January 8th, which states that the military dispositions made by the Regent for suppressing seditious tumults had given so much offence to the People, that they insulted the troops, and one of their officers was obliged to draw his sword to defend himself. This became the signal for a general insurrection, the populace proceeded to the palace, discharged their muskets at it, and the Regent to appease them, was obliged to send a deputation with orders to assure them that all their grievances should be speedily redressed.

Richard Birdwood, Esq; Agent to the East India Company, at Plymouth, arrived at the India House, at two o'clock yesterday morning, with dispatches from Bombay, brought by the Botany Bay ship Queen.

Marquis Cornwallis arrived at Fort William in perfect health the 31st of July.

Captain Mathews, nephew to General Morgan, arrived in town on Tuesday night from the East Indies. Captain Morgan came home in a foreign ship, last from the Mauritius, which place he left on the 1st of November—all was then peace and quietness. Party squabbles seemed at an end, nor had the French in that part of the world the most distant idea of matters being likely to be carried to the extremity that has since taken place in Old France. The Planters were greatly distressed, owing to having lost great numbers of their slaves by the small-pox, in six months, not less than six thousand whites, and twenty thousand slaves having been buried during this period.

There is no specie in the Island, and the Colonial paper has suffered so great a depreciation, that when Capt. Mathews was there, a Spanish dollar was current for twenty livres.

Captain Mathews describes the French settlements in India to be in a most defenceless situation, and in the event of a war taking place they must immediately fall into the hands of the English.
