

are ordered to pursue proper measures for securing to those Frenchmen who may be in the states of the Pope, a safe return to their own country, and to supply them with every necessary assistance—Emigrants, and those who have been sent out of the country are excepted.

Foufrede proposed that the Convention should decree a premium to such French privateers as might bring into port ships belonging to the enemy, loaded with corn or other provisions.—Decreed.

LONDON, Feb. 7, 8, & 9.

The French have commenced hostilities against this Country—They have captured the Pearl, of Plymouth. She was taken by a row-boat privateer on Wednesday night, and carried into Calais. Two Dutch boys have likewise been carried into that port.

Last Monday a French lugger, called the Julien, taken by the Wasp cutter, was carried into Pool.

Yesterday a Spanish courier arrived in town, express from the Court of Madrid, with dispatches to the Marquis del Campo, the Spanish Ambassador in London. The messenger came over to Falmouth in the Infanta man of war of 50 guns, after a passage of only two days and a half from the Groyne, which place he left the 1st instant. The messenger has made one of the quickest journies ever known, having performed it in ten days.

He is said to have brought over the news that the Court of Spain has declared war against France. The Courier is to wait the determination of the Court of London, to know in what manner it will be best for the two Courts to co-operate against the common enemy. The Spaniards will very shortly have a sufficient force ready to protect the Mediterranean seas.

Among other reports of yesterday on 'Change, one was, that four of the seven United Provinces of Holland had declared in favour of France: but this appears totally unfounded. Another was that M. Paris, who killed Pelletier, had been taken, and had immediately shot himself in the head.

All the East-India ships outward bound at this time, are equipped the same as in time of war; they are mostly equal in point of strength, to stout frigates.

Round the grave into which (without a coffin) the mangled remains of Louis were instantly precipitated, and then covered with unslaked lime, a guard still continues to be placed.

DUBLIN, Feb. 14.

The Lord Chancellor, Archbishop of Cashel, the Marquis of Waterford, Earls Westmeath, Shannon, Portarlington, and Farnham, the Viscounts Pery and Clonmell, were yesterday appointed the Secret Committee, to "enquire into the cause of the disturbances prevalent in several counties, &c."

Yesterday's mail brought the very strong protest which was entered into by Lansdown, Lauderdale, and Derby in the House of Peers, against the address to his Majesty, approving the measures of Government, tending to involve us in a war with France.

The substance of the reasons for their dissent, —Because the War is not necessary—Holland not having demanded our assistance, and the misconduct of France, however flagrant, being confined to themselves, was not a good reason for War—Because negotiation was more likely to obtain the objects either of policy or principle than War—Because no advantage is likely to be gained even by a successful War—but, on the contrary, a certain and great addition to the public burdens—and, because, if the declaration of France was fought, it would be more likely to be attained by leaving them to their internal dissensions.
