E N G L A N D.

On Monday last an unprecedented attach-
ment was made by the King's Attorney General
of the sum of One Hundred Thousand Pounds
sterling, standing in the Bank of England in
the name of Mess. Bordieu and Chollet.—The
avowed pretext is, that they suspect this sum
to belong to the Government of France, and
they have filed a bill in Chancery to make the
English house answer to interrogatories, upon
oath, whether this sum is or is not the pro-
perty of the Republic.—They justify the at-
tachment by saying—The French seized on
English ships—they retaliate by seizing on
French money—and the question will be
brought to issue by this means between the
two countries. It will be tried before an Eng-
lish Jury.

Relative to the interior affairs of France, it
is said, that discontent which has been long
known to exist at Lyons, has again produced
some active resistance to the will of the Nation-
al Convention;—that three Commissioners and
six thousand troops, whom this body sent thi-
ther, had found the gates shut, and the inha-
bitants armed, to the number of forty thousand
men; that the troops had withdrawn, without
attempting to force an entrance, but that there
was a very near prospect of a civil war between
the Southern and Northern provinces.

The Ladies of Great-Britain, with the vir-
tuous spirit which has ever distinguished them,
(and which we will not pay them the ill com-
pliment of calling an imitation of Roman pa-
triotism,) have entered into a subscription for
the relief of the widows and children of sold-
iers—more than 2000l. has already been sub-
scribed. We honour our fair countrywomen
for this characteristick mark of their superiority
of mind over the whole world, which will con-
firm the acknowledged Empire of their charms.

Extract of a Letter from Portsmouth, March 13.
" This day arrived here the Dorset armed
cutter, with the Van Hurh brig, laden with
wheat and woollen cloth, bound from Ham-
burgh to Marseilles, a valuable prize.

" The Ferret sloop, Capt. Nowell, which
was in company, likewise took a sloop of 600
tons burthen, laden with wheat and cloth.

" The above prizes were part of the fleet of
20 sail, all deeply laden with corn and clothing,
for France.

from Owen Qu'n, five guineas and a half, to be pillor'd
twice, viz. first Saturday in April and first Saturday in
May, fined ten marks, and to be imprisoned one year.
