

A private letter from Daatziek, dated 15th inst. brings an account that a number of Regiments were posted near that and that it was generally believed they would surrender to the jurisdiction of his Prussian Majesty.

On Friday as the Pelican privateer, belonging to Nicholas Ashton, Esq; of Liverpool, was in that river, by a sudden gust of wind she was blown to the bottom and upwards of forty persons, exclusive of the crew; out of which number only 32 were saved.

His Royal Highness the Duke of York is now in the city. A detachment from the Train of Artillery ordered to be got in readiness to embark for Holland.

It is singular that in the fittings of the National Convention, on the 15th and 16th inst. the word was communicated respecting the Convention in Belgium.

We are happy, also to observe, that the papers, for these days, are entirely free from any reports respecting the capture of vessels. We therefore conclude, that the report of three East-Indiamen having fallen into their hands, is unfounded, for they would not have been in announcing such an event.

It is to be regretted, that the French have shamefully infringed the system of neutrality with regard to Prussia, Palatine, and of Bavaria, by seizing the Duchy of Deux Ponts, and quite lately the Castle and Town of Dürkheim, where they have dismissed all the servants belonging to the Duke, and seized on his effects. — This was done after Custine had sent a safe to the Prince, and approved of his conduct.

Several numerous provincial corps in Paris possess the use to march to the frontiers, saying, that the Capital is in danger from the Counter-Revolutionists, and requires their presence.

The good King of Prussia, despairing, no longer getting a piece of France, has turned his attention to Poland. Under the cloak of friendship, he has made sure of Thorn, and the rest of that unhappy Republic. — He has done so.

There was a Council held yesterday at the office of State's Office, adjoining the Cockpit-Chamber, on business concerning the petition of Sir John Ord, Bart. his Majesty's Secretary of Dominica.

On Saturday night, upon entering the Channel, was fired at by two ships, which were the Theris and Leopard, which mistook the Bedford, as it was very much like a French man of war or Indiaman. In the House of Lords the Duke of Devonshire presented a Petition from the Planters, praying that the House would proceed farther in the consideration of the Slave Trade till after the recess. His Royal Highness presented another to the same effect from the Ship Owners at Liverpool. His Royal Highness after the petitions were read ordered to lie on the Table, moved that the House should proceed farther in the Slave Trade till the 11th of April next. — Ordered.

Mr. Edgeworth, Confessor to the murdered King, is now in this country. It is ascertained how he escaped. Desaze, the elector, is yet alive in Paris. — Another

Traloe, March 22.
