The 30th clause, repeals the act of the 32d of George II. extended and amended by an act passed in the present session of Parliament, so say as relates to a creditor detaining his debtor in prison, after he shall have made every satisfaction in his power—on the creditor paying a weekly allowance for the maintenance of the debtor.

The 31st clause abolishes the obligation of ferving notice to every creditor, at whose suit the debtor, intending to apply for the benefit of the act above mentioned, shall stand charged in execution; and

The 32d claufe applies to the same subject:
The 33d clause enacte, that, if a prisoner shall neglect to comply with the 7th clause, the Court shall delay proceeding upon his petition till the next assizes, &c.

The 34th clause enacts, that the keeper of every jail in England, Wales, and Berwick upon Tweed, shall cause to be published in the London Gazette, on the first Saturday of every month, a list of all the Debtors who are at that time, and have been imprisoned for six months previous to making up such lists; and that such lists shall mention their names, last places of abode, and the sum for which they are imprisoned, and nothing more.

The 35th, 36th, 37th, 38th, 39th, 40th, 41ft, 42d, and 43d claufes, confirms to the prifoner the benefit of the Lord's Act, passed in the present Session of Parliament.

The remaining clauses relate to the Commission of Bankruptey, &c.
