

then give in a schedule of his estate and money in the funds, whether in his own name, or in trust for him.

The 30th clause, repeals the act of the 32d of George II. extended and amended by an act passed in the present session of Parliament, so far as relates to a creditor detaining his debtor in prison, after he shall have made every satisfaction in his power—on the creditor paying a weekly allowance for the maintenance of the debtor.

The 31st clause abolishes the obligation of serving notice to every creditor, at whose suit the debtor, intending to apply for the benefit of the act above mentioned, shall stand charged in execution; and

The 32d clause applies to the same subject:

The 33d clause enacts, that, if a prisoner shall neglect to comply with the 7th clause, the Court shall delay proceeding upon his petition till the next assizes, &c.

The 34th clause enacts, that the keeper of every jail in England, Wales, and Berwick upon Tweed, shall cause to be published in the London Gazette, on the first Saturday of every month, a list of all the Debtors who are at that time, and have been imprisoned for six months previous to making up such lists; and that such lists shall mention their names, last places of abode, and the sum for which they are imprisoned, and nothing more.

The 35th, 36th, 37th, 38th, 39th, 40th, 41st, 42d, and 43d clauses, confirm to the prisoner the benefit of the Lord's Act, passed in the present Session of Parliament.

The remaining clauses relate to the Commission of Bankruptcy, &c.

Sligo, March 26. Yesterday evening, William M'Guire, alias Caffery, and Mary Gunning, charged on the oath of Rose Derrig, for the wilful murder of Hugh Derrig, of Carrigins, near Ballymote in this county, were brought into town under a strong escort, and lodged in separate cells in our gaol.

The above murder, attended with the atrocities mentioned in a former paper, had roused the general energy and exertion of the country, to discover the horrid perpetrators; and circumstances of strong suspicion appearing against the above man and woman, induced the inhabitants of Killala to arrest them in that town, where they were attempting, under the disguise of Pedlars, to purchase tea and other groceries.

Waterford, April 4. Last Monday night, between 11 and 12 o'clock, as John Ryan, and John Quinlan, butchers, were returning home, after drinking at a public-house, in John's Street, they were met by Hugh Logan, and David Dempster, soldiers in the 64th regt. of foot, when a scuffle took place, in which John Ryan was inhumanly murdered by Logan, who also wounded Quinlan in so dreadful a manner that it is thought he cannot recover.—When Ryan received the first wound, he endeavoured to escape, but in running he unfortunately fell, when the villain, who was in close pursuit, instantly came up, and repeatedly stabbed him with his bayonet in different parts of the body; they were both secured and committed to the city gaol. Dempster, who it does not appear took any part in this barbarous affair, has turned king's evidence; he was unarmed, and it is said only came out to bring home Logan, who was a little intoxicated.—

The deceased bore a very good character.

The same night Maurice Power, a mariner, was found murdered in New-street. It is conjectured that he was killed by the same barbarian, as the wound he got was apparently by a
