

A suspension of hostilities between the Austrian and French armies has taken place. The very important proceedings in the Convention, which we this day lay before the public, and the two following Brussels Gazettes extraordinary, will inform our readers of further particulars of this un-looked for event, and of recent advantages gained over the French by the Prussians.

Yesterday afternoon, at five o'clock, Capt. Berkeley, who commanded a squadron of gun-boats in Holland, arrived in London from the Hague, within 32 hours of his leaving that place.

General Dumourier certainly marched on the third for Paris, with the avowed intention of restoring the Monarchy of France. He was joined on his march by numbers of people, who, shocked with the iniquitous murder of Louis the Sixteenth, were now happy to have an opportunity of declaring their sentiments. It was understood in the Austrian Army, that all offensive measures against France were to be suspended during the execution of Dumourier's plan—a proof that the Prince of Saxe Cobourg is well assured of his sincerity.

Accounts are said to be received at the Admiralty, that Admiral Goodal fell in with the French West India fleet, and has taken to sail. [9.] An account was said to have been received this day, at a mercantile house in the city, of Dumourier having been massacred, together with the greatest part of his etat major, by his own troops; it was added, that they immediately after mounted the tri-color cockade, and cried out "Vive la Nation."

Admiral Gell's squadron has captured and sent into Gibraltar, 12 very rich French merchantment.

The report of the French squadron having returned to Brest, is without foundation.

Of the manufacturing towns affected by the present war, Manchester stands the foremost. The number of hands out of employment there is very great; and in consequence thereof, that place daily furnishes a proportionate number of men to the parties beating up for recruits.

An account is just received from Deal, that the French troops are encamped at Nieuport and Furnes, and have done great damage to the villages thereabouts. It is also said, that a column of German troops are gone to Courtray and Ypres, to cut off the French in their retreat from the frontiers.

HOUSE OF COMMONS.

TUESDAY, APRIL 9.

After the Speaker had taken the Chair, Mr. Corry observed, that a speech on a former debate was attributed to him in one of the public papers which he had never delivered, and he warned persons who reported parliamentary proceedings to be more cautious in future.

Mr. Grattan presented a petition from the brewers of the city of Dublin, complaining of monopoly of barley,—which was received, read, and referred to a Committee.

He then moved for several returns of cotton, iron, sugar, and coals imported, which were ordered accordingly.

Cork, April 8. Last Tuesday Henry Ivers Esq; was tried before Judge Chatterton, for having spirited up a mob to assault and beat Thomas M'Grath, Esq; and we are happy to inform the public, that there appeared to the court and jury no grounds whatsoever for an indictment against Mr. Ivers, who was most honourably acquitted, as were also the men charged with the murder of Mr. M'Grath, it having appeared from very respectable evidence that Mr. M'Grath died of a fever.

Ennis, April 11. Last Tuesday evening our Assizes ended, and at the rising of the Court the Rt. Hon. the Prime Serjeant was pleased to deliver to the High Sheriff a respite to stay the execution of Patrick Tuohy until Saturday the 11th of May next. This unfortunate man was to have been executed on Wednesday, and the interference of the humane Judge was the result of some favourable circumstances which he conceived to have appeared on the trial of the Culprit.

Yesterday departed this Life, at his house in Arthur's Row, in an advanced age, Mr. William Blood—an honest Man—highly respected through life, and deservedly regretted in Death.

LIMERICK.

In consequence of the account received on Thursday last, of a Counter Revolution in France, a general Illumination took place in this City and Barracks same night.—A multitude of Inhabitants in order to shew their detestation of the doctrines disseminated in the publications called The Rights of Man, caused a figure of the Author TOM PAINE to be dressed, with one of the Pamphlets affixed to it, accompanied by a drum and six playing the rogues march—after parading the town they consigned the effigy to the flames at Newtown-Pery.

Yesterday at the Quarter Sessions, three Coopers were found guilty of obstructing Denis Lyons, Esq; in carrying on the making up and exporting of Bacon: one was sentenced 6 months imprisonment, and fined ten marks;—the other two three months imprisonment and fined five marks each;—it is sincerely hoped these convictions, will deter from future Combinations.
