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PASSENGERS BY THE EUROPA:
Lieutenant J. Rollo of the 76th Regiment, —Mr. Leekie—M. Chabert—Mr. Jover—Mr. Gilpin—Mr. Madox—Mr. Maxwell—Mrs. Jover—Mrs. Wilkinson—Miss Colvin—Miss Trotter and three Miss Scots.

The General Goddard, was to be dispatched from Bengal, about the middle of December.

The Swallow packet, Captain Curtis, with Sir John Shore, anchored at Table Bay Cape the 7th of January, and sailed the 11th. Sir John was in perfect health, and expected to take possession of the Bengal government early in March.

The Dutch, apprehensive of a war with France, had prudently detained all their shipping at the Cape.

Neither the Tartar packet or Lord Macartney had touched at the Cape.

Marquis Cornwallis was expected to leave Bengal in the month of February last.

A French ship from the Mauritius, called the National Assembly, Captain Courand, of 500 tons, 50 men, bound to port L'Orient, laden with sugar and indigo, as well as two American ships, had touched at, and sailed from St. Helena.

The Europa had been chased by several English privateers, and was absolutely hailed by a Liverpool one, and asked what colours she meant to fight under; the Europa immediately hoisting English ones, soon put an end to the impending contest.

Government has concluded on the measure of sending a Bishop to Canada, and has conferred that dignity on the Rev. Jacob Mountain, Domestic Chaplain to the Bishop of Lincoln, and late Minister of St. Andrew's, Norwich, with an appointment of 2000l. per ann.

It is a curious circumstance, which has not hitherto been noticed, though it may be depended on, that as far back as the middle of January last, 50,000l. stock was purchased by General Dumourier in the English funds:—How the General came to be possessed of such a sum in England, or should at that period choose such a security, is not readily accounted for. It is not possible that any of the Secret Service Money for 1793 could form part of this sum.

The following disagreeable information was yesterday received at the Secretary of State's Office, from Nootka Sound.

A Lieutenant in the British navy, Mr. Hergest, accompanied by Mr. Goosh the astronomer, went on shore among the natives, (who are described by Mr. Meares as a very quiet inoffensive people) and from that description having a confidence in them, they went unarmed; the savages, however, had no sooner got them in their possession, than they fell upon them, and most inhumanly murdered them. An armed party were sent from the ship (the Dædalus) but too late to be of any service, as the two unfortunate gentlemen were already murdered, and the horrid savages were preparing to broil and eat them.—Other accounts state this cruel instance to have happened at Woakou, one of the Sandwich islands.

Authentic accounts from this Settlement, dated September 21, 1792, state that at that time the Spaniards were in possession of Nootka, and had not given any notice of an intention to surrender it; in consequence of which the Chatham brig was about to return home. A store ship had arrived there with provisions for three years; and the Discovery, which reached the coast the latter end of April, 1792, was expected to remain from home four or five years.

is arrived at Cove, to take under convoy any ships bound to the Westward, she will continue with them for 200 leagues and then leave them to the Bonetta sloop, who takes under her care the Newfoundland trade from Cork and Waterford.

APRIL 18. On Friday the 12th inst. was seized near Clogheen, by Arthur Lee, Esq; Surveyor of Excise, assisted by Messrs. Lambly, Robbins and Short, Excise Officers and a Troop of the 14th Light Dragoons, a large copper private still, containing near 400 gallons, with the head and worm, and all the utensils thereunto belonging, three hogshheads of whiskey, and spilled upwards of 4000 gallons of potale. The demolishing of this large distillery must be of essential service to the Fair Trader and to his Majesty's revenue. The above was safely lodged in his Majesty's stores of Clonmel, by the same party.

Yesterday arrived here the Peggy of this port, in eight days from Nantz, in whom came passengers eighteen clergymen belonging to the Irish College there, who were all imprisoned as soon as war was declared, where they remained two months, their effects seized, even their cloaths and books, and some left nothing but what they had on their backs.—The department at length permitted them to come off in the above vessel, as they were subjects of England. The Barbarians who call themselves Patriots, often attempted to force open the Carmelite Convent, where were 108 subjects, in order to put them to death; they have stripped all the churches of plate and every other article of value. Not a Nobleman or Gentleman left in the place, but imprisoned with their wives, or were put to death, it being sufficient to be denounced by any two persons.

The peasants are constantly calling out *vive les Anglois*, and are in daily expectations of the arrival of the English troops, which would be joined by all the peasants, and had they fire-arms would be superior to the National Guards. Provisions of every kind were excessively scarce and dear, and every day presented horrid spectacles of murder and rapine.

Yesterday 1300 men of the English Independent Companies marched into this City from Cove, to do duty in Ireland, and those raised here are to be sent to England.

Last Saturday, the 27th and 28th regiments sailed from Cove; the former for Guernsey to replace the 54th, and the latter for Jersey to relieve the 59th regt.
