

proved. The Barons differed, three [Yelverton, Hamilton, and Metge] against one, [Baron Power] and the verdict accordingly stands—but in consequence of the difference, without costs. Mr. Baron Metge's argument was repeated with legal information—as was the Lord Chief Baron's with animation, urbanity, and eloquence.

A case of the same kind is shortly to be argued in the same Court, which has been tried at the Lent Assizes, at Galway—in which the damages were no less than 10,000l.

KING'S BENCH.

WEDNESDAY, April 24.

This day his Majesty's Attorney General moved the Court of King's Bench for two Writs of *Certiorari*, to bring up two indictments found at the Assizes of Dundalk, against James N. Tandy, Esq; one for a misdemeanor in dispersing a seditious libel entitled "*Common Sense*"; and another for a felony in taking an unlawful oath, commonly called the "*Defender's Oath*."

The Attorney General observed, that Mr. Tandy had thought proper to forfeit his recognizance for 100l. to appear to the first indictment, and to avoid going to Dundalk, after coming within a few miles of the town; and he made this motion in order to proceed to an *Outlawry* against Mr. Tandy.

Lord Clonmel said, that Mr. T. in giving bail before him, had deceived him, by asserting that another Judge had demanded only 100l. bail from another person charged with dispersing the same libel. This he found now to be untrue; and for his own part, he believed, had he seen the libel in question before that time, as he since had, that he would have demanded much higher bail—perhaps to the amount of 1000l.

The motion was granted.

QUE RE.—If a Representative of a Corporation be outlawed, will his place in the City Assembly thereby become vacant?

Counsel on behalf of James Napper Tandy, Esq; applied yesterday to the King's Bench to the Court—for a writ of *Certiorari* to remove an indictment found for felony against James Napper Tandy, Esq; at the last assizes holden for the county of Louth at Dundalk, which was awarded accordingly.
