the present distresses of the working manufacturers in this city and the liberties thereof, and to consider of, and adopt the means most likely to relieve such branches of the manufactures as may be found at present to stand in the greatest need thereof.

In the absence of the Lord Mayor, Mr. Sheriff Hutton took the chair.

The report, which contained several resolutions, being read, Mr. Beresford stated, that he had that morning, in company with Mr. Fyans, a manufacturer, gone into the liberty, and that in three streets he found that there were 244 persons out of employment, whose families amounted to 648;—he said that their situation was such, in point of poverty and wretchedness, as could scarcely be described; several of them were without clothing, bed, or bedding; he distributed tickets for an immediate supply of bread to them;—some whom he had visited refused to be supported in that manner, and all they wished for was to be employed at work.

Mr. Harvey suggested the idea of entering into a subscription for the purpose of purchasing the goods on the hands of the manufacturers, which, he said, would be the means of setting the persons out of employment immediately at work.

Mr. Barrington proposed, that the select Committee should be directed to sit, from time to time, in order to receive information, and to adopt such further resolutions as might tend to alleviate the present distresses of the working manufacturers.

Mr. Sheares threw out the idea, that Government should purchase all the goods on the hands of the manufacturers, and that they should issue Exchequer bills for the same, which, he said, would be the means of giving employment to the workmen who are now out of work.

Mr. Emmett arraigned the conduct of the Committee, in not having traced the origin of the present distresses, which he attributed to England having imprudently entered into the present war. He made some observations of a political nature, which were by no means relevant to the object of the meeting.

Mr. Beresford replied to Mr Emmet. Mr. Barrington defended the conduct of the Committee.

Mr. Jaffray also defended the conduct of the Directors of the National Bank, who were alluded to in some observations which fell from Mr. Beresford.

On the motion of Mr. Alexander, the resolutions contained in the report were read paragraph by paragraph, and after some amendments, they were agreed to, after which the Assembly adjourned, and the Committee were directed to sit from time to time, and report their proceedings at a future day, of which public notice should be given.

Yesterday morning, a most respectable old Gentleman, who on Sunday attended the Charity Sermon at St. Mary's Chapel, and at the time contributed to the Collection, gave A. Watson, Treasurer to the House of Industry, three Guineas for said Charity.

Last Sunday night, about 12 o'Clock, seven Villains with their faces disguised, broke into the house of the Widow Clarke, at Lisnamrock, near Kilpeacon, and after beating the servants, and threatening to cut Mrs. Clarke and the family with long knives, with which they were armed; they robbed the house of some Cash, a short Gun, a Man's new Hat, a parcel of sheets, and other articles.
