We are as yet ignorant of the issue of this affair; but are told that the French have been defeated, and that three of their number have been made prisoners in the Chateau of Harquelinne.

OSTEND, May 18. A Fleet has just anchored in our roads, supposed to be the artillery from the river Thames. The French, who are in great force at Dunkirk, are again threatening us. Last night there was a strong skirmishing between our advanced posts and them, near Furnes; but as we have not any thing since morning
