TUESDAY, MAY 28.

Ordered, that the Speaker do make out his warrant to the Clerk of the Hanaper, to iffue a writ for electing a Burgefs to ferve in the prefent Parliament, for the Borough of Cloughnakilly, in the county of Cork, in the room of Charles O'Neile, Efq; deceafed.


