HOUSE OF COMMONS.

TUESDAY, MAY 28.

Ordered, that the Speaker do make out his warrant to the Clerk of the Hanaper, to issue a writ for electing a Burgess to serve in the present Parliament, for the Borough of Cloughnakeilly, in the county of Cork, in the room of Charles O'Neile, Esq; deceased.

The Attorney General said, he was commanded by his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant to deliver a message to the House, which he read in his place; the purport of it was, that his Excellency had, during the recess, received application from the merchants of the City of Dublin, on the 6th instant, respecting the state of public credit, and that in consequence of such application, he had taken such measures as appeared to him most likely to give support to the commercial credit of the metropolis, and of the kingdom in general; and he expressed a confidence that the measures which he had adopted would meet with the approbation of the House.

The message was read from the Chair, and it was then ordered that his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant's message be entered on the Journals of the House.

The Attorney General then presented, by the command of his Excellency, the report of the Privy Council, the resolutions of the Merchants, and the Directors of the Bank of Ireland relative to said business, which were ordered to lie on the table.

He then moved, that this House do, on Friday next, resolve itself into a Committee of the whole House, to take into consideration his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant's message delivered to the House this day, which was agreed to.—House adjourned to next day.

WEDNESDAY, May 29.

Mr. Pery reported from the Committee to whom the Petition of John Tuthill, of the City of Limerick, Esq; and George Tuthill, eldest son, and heir apparent of the said John Tuthill, was referred, that the petitioners had fully proved the allegations in the said petition.

The petition set forth, that in the year 1769, George Tuthill, Esq; deceased, who was father of the petitioner, John Tuthill, was possessed of certain Lands in the County of Limerick, which were settled with certain limitations and remainders previous to the marriage with Elizabeth Jackson: That the petitioner, George, on his marriage did execute certain deeds, and suffer recovery, for the payment of several sums to his father, and for other purposes; but that as the calling in the several sums might prove injurious to, and destructive of the estates limited to the petitioner George, and his issue, they apply for an Act of Parliament, to vest in trustees certain parts of the said Lands, that they may raise and levy the sums to be paid.

Mr. Pery moved for leave to bring in a bill on the said petition, which being granted, the same gentleman presented a bill accordingly, which was received, read a first time, and ordered to have a second reading to-morrow,

when the letters which brought the above accounts were dispatched, the prisoners were under a strong guard confined in one of Lord Kingston's houses.

It was in this village that Mr. Tennison's house and offices were burnt a few days ago by the same party, who have suffered so much by their temerity in violating the laws.

The Trumpeter's horse was shot under him; but it does not appear by the letters that any of the soldiers or their assistants were hurt.

Letters received yesterday in town from Enniskillen, state, that a rencontre took place in that quarter on Tuesday, between a party of rioters, amounting to some thousands, assembled to oppose the magistrates of the county, in carrying into effect the militia act, and a party of dragoons, in which seven of the former were killed, eleven wounded, and above one hundred taken prisoners.

At Manor Hamilton, in the county of Leitrim, a like disturbance arose; a mob set upon an officer going through the town with a small party of the military, who were forced to fire in defence of their own lives—Eight of the rioters were killed and several wounded, when the rest took to flight.
