

said the counties in which no objection is made to the militia are where no ballot has taken place, and where an inducement has been held out voluntarily. He was of opinion, that some regulations might be adopted so, as to give satisfaction;—this idea he threw out, but he should make no motion on the subject, but he hoped it might be brought forward at a future day.

The Hon. Mr. Forster presented a Bill to provide for the families of persons chosen by lot to serve in the militia of this kingdom,—which was read a first time, and ordered to be read a second time on Monday, and ordered to be printed.

Col. Blaquiere moved that the Judges and Revenue Officers be exempted from serving in the militia.

The motion was objected to be entertained by the chair, as the Speaker said that no motion could be received which goes to overthrow the law of the land.

Col. Blaquiere then moved, that an entry on the journals of some words made use of in warmth by a noble Lord, in a debate in the course of this Session, be expunged.—This motion was not seconded, and the question of adjournment was immediately put and carried.—House adjourned to Monday.

In the battle of Farnas, Major General Ralph Abercromby, at the head of an English brigade, appears foremost in the rank of honour. He led the 14th and 53d regiments, with a battalion formed from the grenadiers and light infantry against the strongest of the enemy's redoubts, which he carried after a severe action. This gallant officer was Lieutenant Colonel of the Carabineers in the last war, from which he was promoted by his Majesty appointing him to raise the 103d Regiment or Royal Irish Infantry; by the ability of General Abercromby that Regiment was completed in three months after the order to raise it was issued, and in less than six months from its formation, was reported by the reviewing General to be the best disciplined regiment on the establishment. It was reduced in 1783 at Cork, where the beloved Commander was chaired by his soldiers; he has now the 6th Regiment of Infantry.

By a Gentleman of the best political intelligence we are informed, that the Royalists in Brittany amount at present to one hundred and fifty thousand men, determined to die, or recover the Constitution of their country.—To give such assistance as may be thought necessary to these men, may perhaps be the best mode of Alliance, as well as the best method of carrying on the war.

Thursday last the General Assembly of Scotland had under consideration, the case of the Rev. Mr. M'Naught, minister of Girihon, accused of blasphemy, ridiculing the Scriptures, irunkeness, bribery and corruption, acting oppressively, taking money as a Justice of Peace, and a variety of other immoral actions. The counsel for Mr. M'Naught objected to proceeding in the cause in the absence of Mr. M'Naught who is at present prisoner in the Tolbooth of Kirkcudbright, on a civil action. The committee of the Assembly without a vote repelled the objection; after which, parties and Counsel were read on the merits of the cause. The General Assembly, after hearing the report of the Committee, unanimously, "in the name of the Lord Christ, the sole King and Head of this Church, do hereby declare Mr. M'Naught from the office of Minister of the Gospel."

Yesterday, being the Anniversary of the Birth of our Most Gracious Sovereign, KING GEORGE the III. who entered on the 56th year of his age, the morning was ushered in with the ringing of Bells; at 12 o'Clock the 34th regiment of foot, commanded by Captain Forbes, elegantly clothed in their new regimentals, marched to Arthur's-Quay, where they fired three Volleys, the two field-pieces which are attached to the regiment returning the salute; and the night concluded with a Grand Ball, ringing of Bells, and a general Illumination throughout the City.

As a number of Brave Fellows have entered and are daily entering as Volunteers to serve in the Militia for this City, by which generous conduct (if the Regiment shall be soon completed,) their fellow Citizens and Countrymen will be eased the necessity of serving therein or finding Substitutes; A Subscription is therefore opened at the Mayor's Office in the Exchange, for the purpose of creating a Fund to supply such of these Volunteers as may want them, with Jackets, Trowsers, and other necessaries, to be purchased in this City;—And it is hoped that the liberal Inhabitants thereof and of the liberties, will eagerly embrace this Opportunity of testifying their Gratitude to their spirited Defenders, and of having a considerable sum of money expended for the benefit of the public at large. The completing of the Regiment by VOLUNTEERS will be the most decided INSURANCE against any particular Persons being OBLIGED to carry Arms therein.
