HOUSE OF COMMONS.

WEDNESDAY, JUNE 5.

The House resolved into a Committee on the Hon. Mr. Foster's Bill, for providing for the wives and children of ballotted Militia men, during their absence on actual service.

Mr. G. Ponsonby expressed his fears that the

anniversary of his Majesty's Birth day, the same was observed here with a degree of eclat never before witnessed in this part of the kingdom—all ranks, all descriptions of persons seemed to vie with each other in tokens of loyalty.—The Roman Catholic Clergy of the Diocese dined together on the occasion, and the other inhabitants of that persuasion were emulous in distinguishing themselves. An elegant entertainment was provided at the Court-house by directions and at the expence of Lord Conyngham, to which his Lordship invited the Officers of the garrison of Clare, the most respectable gentlemen of the country, and the corps of Ennis Volunteers. The dinner was served up in excellent style, and the company did not break up until a late hour, during which time loyalty, patriotism, and good fellowship, were eminently conspicuous. The King's health was drank with three cheers, and answered each time by a volley from a detachment of the military from Clare Castle, who were by directions of his Lordship, drawn up in the front of the Court-house for that purpose.
