EXTRACT FROM THE OFFICIAL JOURNAL OF THE OPERATIONS OF THE UNITED ARMIES OF SUNDAY, June 9.

The fire of the enemy does no damage to our works round Valenciennes, the workmen being alarmed.

They are so far advanced, that the French are portie to-day from the citadel to hinder the completion of a redoubt which is in front. We fired on them with six pounders, and the balls fell on

The attack will begin very soon.—The French are in a terrible dilemma; they are Deputies to Prince Cobourg to-day, to spare the city. It is said, that

accompanied them was coming home merely on account of her bad condition, and was so far from being capable of rendering them any assistance, that had a single ship of war fallen in with them, she could scarcely have avoided being taken herself, as her hold was so full of water, that she was with difficulty kept from sinking, and was obliged to put into Portsmouth, from mere distress.

Tuesday the 11th Instant, died at Grange-house, near Edinburgh, (Scotland) after a lingering illness, which he bore with exemplary fortitude and resignation, the Rev. William Robertson, D. D. Principal of the University of Edinburgh, Historiographer to His Majesty for Scotland, one of His Majesty's Chaplains in Scotland, and one of the Ministers of the Old Greyfriars Parish in that City.—He was born in the year 1721; licensed in 1743; and in 1761 was elected Principal of the University of Edinburgh.
