

However celebrated he has been in the field for personal achievement, he is not less remarkable as a negotiator, for he has been at the bottom of half the intrigues that have been practised at Paris, and he was able to pursue, and to manage and to dictate these, in the midst of his most hazardous enterprises.

Prior to his succeeding to the command of La Fayette's army he had a duel with that General. They fought with swords, and Dumourier wounded him in the side. Of all the military men that perhaps ever lived, there is no man who has exposed himself to more personal hazard than Dumourier. He has had various horses shot under him: he has led on regiments, both of horse and foot to the very mouth of the cannon of the enemy, and he has repeatedly rode from right to left in the midst of a heavy discharge of artillery, and back again, while the suite that followed him have almost all been killed—Yet he never received the smallest wound.

As a Negotiator, he is to be as much talked of as a Commander—for he had many Negotiations with the Duke of Brunswick, some with Lord Auckland, and there is reason to believe, some with our Cabinet.

He had secret correspondence during the entire of last winter with almost every town in Holland, and at the same time had his own party to manage in the National Convention, which was a much more difficult task.

Dumourier, it is said, is going to America.

The dresses of Lord Courtnay's servants, at the concert and supper, lately given by him, were by far the most splendid ever seen in this country. All the coats were lined with white satin, embroidered in gold with *fleurs de lis*. The hats cost twenty guineas each.

HOUSE OF COMMONS.
