

that Ireland made. He went over all the arguments that had been used in former sessions for three years against Ireland participating in the trade beyond the Cape of Good Hope; and retorted them on the makers—at the close he said that the concession was so momentous to Great Britain that it demanded some return, and none adequate could be made, but an equality of trade between Ireland and Britain: he therefore moved to resolve.

“That for the encouragement, and the extension of the trade of Great Britain and Ireland, it would be expedient that the goods of Ireland should be admitted into the ports of Great Britain, on the same terms as like goods, the produce or manufacture of Great Britain, are imported into Ireland.”

The Speakers on the side of the motion were, Messrs. Grattan, Forbes, Graydon, Duquery, and Vandeleur; against it, the Chancellor of the Exchequer, the Secretary of State, the Hon. Mr. Stewart, Sir Hercules Langrishe, Dr. Duigenan, Mr. Corry, Mr. Pery, Col. Conyngham, Sir William Gleadowe, and Mr. Secretary Hobart.

At half past 12 the House went into committee on the East India trade bill, Mr. Corry in the chair; made some progress, and to sit again this day. Adjourned to this day.

On Tuesday last Samuel Busby and Judith his wife, were tried on three separate indictments for assault and false imprisonment of their three daughters, Rebecca, Mary and Jane—on the two first the Jury found them guilty; they were acquitted on the third. The trial lasted several hours, the evidence was principally that of the children; as to general circumstances of harshness and severity, that of other persons went to corroborate particular facts. The Judges then ordered the traversers into the custody of the Sheriff, to be lodged in his Majesty's Gaol of Newgate, until the Court should order them to receive sentence.

So enormous a misdemeanor as that tried on Tuesday last, at the Commission of Oyer and Terminer, is without parallel in the calendar of our criminal courts.
