means the rents deriving from them were trivial, Persons who held them, found it difficult to dispose of them to any advantage; and many of them were almost wholly unproductive.

A Right Hon. Gentleman, who is a member of the English Parliament, and who is also at the head of Administration in this country—and whose exertions to promote the amity and confidence between both, and in a very peculiar degree, the prosperity of this, having considered this matter, did bring forward a bill in the English House of Commons for devesting the English Commissioners of the management of those estates, and re-vesting it in his Majesty.

Consonantly, however, to the constitutional principles of this country, it became necessary to pass a law for this purpose, and the object of the present bill was to vest the title of these estates in his Majesty—subject in their disposal to the controul of the Irish Parliament.

The rents collectable from the estates, which at present remain unfold, amount to but 800l. a year; by this act an authority for their proper management would be established in Ireland, and their product of course rendered much more considerable—besides many worthy families would be considerably benefited by the event.

Leave was accordingly given—and the bill was presented, and read the first time.

SATURDAY, JULY 6.

The CHAN. of the EXCHEQUER said, that on Tuesday next he should bring forward his intended statement respecting the granting a civil list; in the mean time, he had made out a great number of papers, which were more of a calculatory than official nature, and which should be left in the clerk's office for inspection of gentlemen.—He said that on Tuesday, in the Committee of Supply, he should propose a vote for the civil list. He then moved that the House do, on Tuesday next, resolve itself into a Committee of Supply, for the purpose of ascertaining the quantum of the Civil List.

A short conversation took place between Mr. Forbes, Mr. Vaodeleur, and the Chancellor of the Exchequer, when the motion was agreed to.

Mr. TYDD reported the bill for giving relief in proceedings upon writs of mandamus, for the admission of freemen into Corporations.—Ordered to be Engrossed.

Mr. GRAYDON moved, that the Committee on the revenue bill be empowered to receive a clause for applying the duties on imported cotton thread, for the encouragement of hosiery, by paying bounties on cotton thread made in this kingdom for hosiery use.—The motion was negatived.

Read a second time, and committed for Monday, the bill for the relief of his Majesty's faithful subjects, the Protestant Dissenters of this kingdom.

House adjourned to Monday.
