

administer the Defenders Oath to the inhabitants; the Rev. Mr. Luther, Rector of Bruff, refusing to comply with their demands, and attempting to take some of them into custody, was cut and bruised in a most shocking manner.

The City and Neighbourhood has been in a state of general alarm since Monday last:—On Sunday night at 11 o'Clock, the Mayor received an Express from Charles S. Oliver, Esq; of Castle-Oliver, County Limerick, that he had on that day armed a few of his tenants, and pursued a number of those misguided wretches who were administering unlawful Oaths in his neighbourhood, eleven of whom he took and lodged in Kilfinan Goal; but being apprehensive their associates might attempt a rescue, in bringing them to this County Goal, requested a military guard might be sent him; accordingly at three o'Clock on Monday morning, a Captain and 50 men of the 34th regiment, with Ter. Monfell, Esq; a Justice of the Peace for this County, proceeded for Kilfinane:—At two o'Clock same evening, an Express arrived that the Mob were in great force near Bruff, had disarmed a Recruiting Party coming to Limerick, and were on their way to rescue the Prisoners at Kilfinane; in consequence of which Captain Forbes, assembled the remainder of his regiment, the recruiting parties, and a few of the City Militia, and, with two field pieces, immediately marched off to Bruff, under the command of Walter Widenham, Esq; on entering the Village, they were fired upon by some of the Rioters from behind walls and out of houses, two of the Military were wounded, and one Militia Man killed; the Artillery were directed to fire on those houses, which with a full discharge from the troops on the persons who were making their escape, must have made great havoc among those deluded people: nor did the firing entirely subside until about 12 o'Clock same night, the Rioters taking the opportunity of the darkness, by firing upon the Troops as at first.—From every account given, there were more than 40 of the infuriated Peasants killed, and several others dangerously wounded, who were taken away by their friends.—Yesterday evening Captain Forbes's detachment and Artillery arrived in town, bringing with them two men prisoners, who were taken in one of the houses from whence the King's troops were annoyed.

At eleven last night, C. S. Oliver, and Ter. Monfell, Esq; with the guard which left town on Monday morning, arrived and brought in 24 prisoners, who were committed by Mr. Monfell to the County Goal; to abide their trials at the ensuing Assizes.

The spirited conduct of Terence Monfell, and Walter Widenham, Esq; who commanded the above parties, is spoken of by the Officers and Privates as a model for all Magistrates at this time of general Riot; and the behaviour of the troops has gained for the 34th regt. the esteem of every Gentleman who shared in their fatigues; it gives us pleasure to hear that the brave veteran Captain Forbes, highly approved of the steadiness of the few Militia Men who were attached to the Artillery.

To give the Public an idea of the cool intrepid conduct of C. S. Oliver, Esq; would require the pen of the most able Panegyrist; on his committing the first prisoners to Kilfinan Goal, an irritated mob attacked the prison, of which he and a number of his faithful Freeholders took possession, to dislodge them and liberate the Prisoners; they set fire to all the buildings adjoining, and placed a quantity of combustible matter in the market-house which forms the lower part of the Jail; at this instant Mr. Oliver caused the flooring of the room he was in to be ripped up, and kept up a continued fire on the delinquents, some of whom were killed, others taken prisoners, and the rest obliged to desert from their wicked intention.—Monday Mr. Oliver found means to send for some Cavalry to Malrow and Clogheen from which places two troops of the 14th Regt. were instantly dispatched, and with that promptitude which at present particularly distinguishes the King's troops, arrived at Kilfinan in a short time.—The mob thus disappointed in their intention, seized James Langton, Esq; a Justice of the Peace for this County, on his return from Bruff, whom they kept as an hostage, threatening him with the most cruel death, if the associates was not set at liberty, at the same time compelling him to write to Mr. Oliver that if he did not comply with their demand, that on return of the messenger, who was Mr. Langton's servant, they would instantly hang him; for which purpose, a woman who composed one of his guard absolutely tore her shift in strips and formed it into a Cord:—On Mr. Oliver's consulting Mr. Langton's friends, he determined not to write an answer, but directed the servant to say they were all liberated; this had not the desired effect on the mob, who were about to execute their fatal purpose, when they were alarmed by the approach of Captain Forbes's detachment, and fled to the assistance of their associates at Bruff, at which time Mr. Langton fortunately escaped.

On the march of Mr. Oliver's party into town last night, they were fired on by some infuriated villains, near Bruff; the fire was returned by the troops, which killed three of them on the spot, and three were taken prisoners.

The inhabitants of Charleville, in the handsomest manner, have shewn their detestation of Riot, and a determination of supporting the Law; on being informed

to convene the County, which he has taken the earliest opportunity of complying with;—Saturday next being fixed on for taking into consideration those alarming proceedings.

Major Vallotton of the 56th regt. was so desparately wounded last Thursday, while on duty at the head of the Grenadier company in quelling a mob at Wexford, that he Died on Saturday.

Yesterday a division of the County Limerick Royal Militia, under the command of Captain Henry Brown, marched into town from Rathkeal, to receive their arms, &c.

Yesterday the General Quarter Sessions for this City, was adjourned to the 25th Inst.
