Cork, July 17. We are happy to inform our Fellow-Citizens, that an order has been lately issued by the Mayor and Council, for a new valuation of all the houses in the City of Cork and its Suburbs, which do not pay taxes and rates; by this, so long wished for measure, it is imagined that the rates now paid, will be reduced, at least, *Three Pence* in the pound, a great object to the inhabitants, not one of whom, in a well regulated Society, should be tax-free, at the expense of his neighbour.

This day 3 companies of the 43^d. regt. set out for Waterford, to replace the 64th ordered for embarkation, and this day the last mentioned regt. marched in here on their way to Cove.

L I M E R I C K.

The following Abridgment of the Act of the 27th of George the 3^d. chap. 15. will serve to inform these ignorant or deluded Men, who have injured the Country so materially, by disturbing its Peace, of the punishments to which they have subjected themselves—and it is hoped, will deter others from following the evil example:

“An Act to prevent tumultuous risings and assemblies, and for the more effectual punishment of persons guilty of outrage, riot, and illegal combination, and of administering and taking unlawful oaths.

It enacts, “That if any persons to the number of twelve, meet in an unlawful and riotous manner, and do not disperse when required, as is therein directed, by any peace-officer, they shall be deemed Felons, and shall suffer Death.

“That all such persons may be seized and carried before a Justice of the Peace, and if any of them be killed, the persons so killing them are indemnified.

“That all persons so assembled pulling down, burning, or fastening up any Church or Chapel, or by threats or force obstructing any Clergyman from officiating, or maiming or hurting him, shall be deemed Felons and suffer Death.

“That all persons (not authorized by Law to administer Oaths) in any manner causing unlawful oaths or engagements to be taken, shall be Transported for Life.

“That persons taking such oaths or engagements not being compelled by inevitable necessity; shall be Transported for Seven Years.

“That all persons who dig, erect or provide, or cause to be dug, erected or provided, any grave, gallows or gibbet, or any instrument for inflicting pain or punishment, or shall use force or threats, in order to prevent any person from giving evidence, or collecting any rates or taxes, or to induce or compel any person to enter into any unlawful combination, or shall destroy or threaten to destroy any property or inflict any punishment for any such purpose, shall, together with those who aid and assist them, suffer Death and be Dissected.

“That every person who shall print, write, post, or publish, knowingly circulate, or deliver
