Though none of the ancestors of our gracious Monarch wanted personal courage, yet few of them have had so trying an opportunity of being more distinguished than the Duke of York. Many illustrious men have entered early on the career of military glory, but we have seldom heard of a youth, who had never seen real service, plunged all at once into the horrors, difficulties, and dangers of an obstinate siege. The event, though highly pleasing to Humanity, must be doubly interesting to all his Majesty's good subjects, who have the satisfaction to find his gallant son not only crowned with honour, but perfectly safe from the rude cannon's mouth, and the inveterate teeth of the fell dogs of war.

This day the first division of the 6th Regiment of Dragoon Guards, marched from the Barracks on their route to Cork, under the command of Lieut. Colonel Arthur Ormsby, accompanied by the Major, Sir Thomas Chapman.—To-morrow the second division, under the command of Captain French, will proceed on the same route.

The *Managers of Sedition* being at present confined to their chambers on various accounts, have employed some additional performers for the out department. These auxiliary traitors appear on the steps of the Royal-Exchange Coffee-House at a late hour at night, and after collecting an audience, by exciting curiosity with their noisy declamation, they proceed to execute their commission—in representing Robbery, Murder and Atheism as the best civic duties, extolling the regicides of France as the most virtuous people on earth—and uttering treason against our KING, our Constitution and State.

The Officer who commanded the Castle Guard on Tuesday night, being informed of this meeting of Jacobin emissaries, sent to the High Sheriffs of the city to authorize him by their presence to disperse them, or to take into custody such as were most criminal.—*Unfortunately*, the Sheriffs were not at home; for we doubt not that they would have felt it a disgrace to the Magistracy to allow such an assembly to exist within the very precincts of the Castle. Should another opportunity occur, we trust it will merit the attention of the Chief Magistrate.

As might have been foreseen, these conspirators against society became audacious from impunity, and last night assembled at an earlier hour than they were wont to do; the Castle Guard, under the direction of Magistrates, surprised them in the moment of seditious oration; the orator was taken into custody, and committed to Newgate.

We hear that some day last week a French row-galley, carrying 15 or 16 swivels, attempted to land a number of men, in two long boats, between the Main and the Rosses, on the north west coast of this kingdom; but an alarm being given, the country people assembled, to the amount of 500, well furnished with muskets, and ranged themselves on the beach, where they fired at the boats, and wounded several; on which the crew thought proper to return to their vessel, and make sail, steering due west.
