Though none of the ancellors of our greenous Monarch wanted personal courage, yet few of them have had to trying an opportunity of being more diffinguished than the Duke of York. Many Illuttrious men have entered early on the career of military glory, but we have feldom heard of a youth, who had never feen real fervice, plunged all at once into the horrors, difficulties, and dangers of an obitinate fiege. The event, though highly pleafing to humanity, must be doubly integelling to all his Majesty's good subjects, who have the fatistaction to find his gallant fon not only growned with honour, but perfectly fale from the rude cannon's mouth, and the inventoried tee h of the fell dogs of war,

This day the first division of the 6th Regiment-of Dragoon Guards, marched from the Barracks on their route to Cork, under the command of Lieut, Colonel Arthur Ormsby, accompanied by the Major, Sir Thomas Chapman,—To-morrow the second division, under the command of Captain French, will proceed on the same route.

The Managers of Sedition being at present confined to their chambers on various accounts, have employed some additional performers for the out department.
