

... granted him on motion, that in case he excites the slightest motion, he shall be called to a very severe punishment.

The trade, now carried on by the Dutch merchants, in supplying the deficiency of gold, by the exportation to Flanders, is supposed to be in their favour, to the amount of £50,000 weekly.

Capt. Ralph Dundas, who so unfortunately died in bravely attempting to save the lives of his female passengers, is a distant relation of Mr. Secretary Dundas, and was the head of the Family of that name. He has a wife and four children to lament his loss.

The Winterton East Indiaman seems to have been marked for misfortune from the moment she was launched. On her first voyage, she sprung a leak; on her second, she was nearly within sight of Port; and on the voyage she last, she lost fifty of her crew, by sickness.

When Captain Bligh left Otaheite, the natives were daily improving in the arts of luxury and refinement; those, who were formerly decked with the present of a rusty nail, now in no present worth their acceptance under the size of a hatchet; but fire arms and gunpowder are the great objects of their desire; the friends of humanity will be sorry to find, that these people had no less than thirty firelocks and two blunderbusses, with a considerable quantity of powder, when the sloop departed from that island.

Lord Howe has got his fleet reinforced, recalled, and re-watered. It is expected that the Lordship will put to sea as this day or tomorrow.

Dunkirk, in the present War, will be a great addition to this country.—The communication will be more immediate, and consequently a considerable expence will be saved in sending supplies to our army.

The taking of Dunkirk, and the keeping it in the possession of England, will put the finishing blow to smuggling, and consequently will be of the utmost importance to the Revenue of the country.

An account was yesterday received, that the fleets in la Vendee, after a sharp engagement had taken possession of les Sobles, a good and sea port in that Department.—If they are able to maintain themselves, they will open them a communication with the British fleet when it appears next on the coast. Lord Howe's instructions allow him to have any communication with them.

Following were the positions of the divisions of the Continent, according to the dispatches:

On the 19th instant, the Duke of York's orders were at Menin, leading to Dunquerque. The Corps of Prussians which assisted in the siege of Valenciennes, are now investing the neighbourhood. General Clairfait is investing the town; and the head quarters of the Duke of Cobourg were on the 11th inst. at the King of Prussia's head quarters at Sarrelouis, not far distant from Sarrelouis.

Several operations before Cambray, we have since the Duke of York left Bourbourg. The character of General Clairfait, may conclude that these are pushy operations and vigour. upwards of 2000 letters, brought homeward-bound East Indiamen, were put out at the General Post Office.
