Many persons have expressed their dissatisfaction, that with all our numerous naval force, we have had no general action with the enemy, but they should consider the safe arrival of the East and West India, the Lisbon, Oporto, Mediterranean and Newfoundland merchant fleets, as of more real account to a commercial nation, than could have arisen from any naval engagement. The distribution of our ships of war for the protection of commerce, does more actual service to the country than the keeping them together in large fleets, that would not afford sufficient convoys.—Now indeed that most of our distant traders are safe in port, our men of war may be more conveniently employed against the fleets of France, wherever they may be found, and something decisive may be successfully attempted—especially as the supply of seamen from these homeward bound fleets, may man the fleets sitting out.

We have the pleasure of hearing, that an entire new coinage of silver money will commence about the beginning of March next, at the public mint in London; some say to the amount of sixty thousand, and others to that one hundred thousand pounds. This supply, when issued and dispersed, must be a great relief to private and public dealers, many of the latter being possessed of large sums in base adulterated stuff, not worth one penny in the bill.
