CORK, September 26. Last Tuesday evening forty five sail of transports with the troops on board, failed under convoy of two of his Majesty's frigates for Spithead, with a fair wind.

Same day the Right Hon. the Lord Chancellor arrived in town, on his way to the island, on a visit to the Right Hon. Silver.
