At the adjourned Assizes of Wexford, the
7th of October, Lewis Lambert was that day
put on his trial, on an indictment against him
as accessory before the fact, to the murder of
Major Valotten, last July. His Counsel moved
the Court for leave to withdraw his plea of
Not Guilty. (which he had put in on his ar-
raignment last assizes) in order to offer a spe-
cial plea, viz. that Mr. Loftus, one of the
Grand Jury who found the bills, was not a
Freeholder. This the Court refused to allow.
He was then given in charge to the Petit Jury,
who, after a trial which continued from ten in
the morning till five in the evening, returned a
verdict of Not Guilty.

The Counsel for the Crown then put off his
trial on the other indictment, and he was there-
fore admitted to bail.

Tuesday a Privy Council was held in the
Castle, which was attended by the Lord Chan-
cellor, the Marquis of Drogheda, Lord Vis-
count Clonmel, the Lord Bishop of Meath,
Lord Carleton, Mr. Latouche, and several
other Members.

We have it from good authority, that our
Parliament will sit for the dispatch of business
early in the next month.

The Officers who raised Independent Com-
panies in Ireland, and who were ordered to
transfer their men to different regiments, are
allowed their rank as Captains in the new corps.

It was the injudicious and violent proclama-
tion of the Duke of Brunswick, together with
his indiscreet attempt to force his way to Paris,
that in all probability brought the unhappy
Louis to the guillotine, who, if no foreign
power had interfered, might still have lived;
and if his sincere attachment to the Constitution
had been confirmed by his conduct as well as
by his professions, might have preserved the af-
fections of his people. We lament his fate, but
cannot think his conduct was such as to remove
all suspicions of his sincerity.
