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ternoon.—His first directions are to the Duke of York, who is encamped about 18 miles to the east of Liff, to check that garrison and support Prince Cobourg. The Messenger is then to make his way to the Prussian head-quarters at Manheim; and after having delivered his dispatches to the Earl of Yarmouth, he is to follow the King of Prussia, to Berlin, with letters stated to be of a very important nature.

By a letter from on board the Queen Charlotte, dated Oct. 16, we are informed that Lord Howe had ordered the signal to be hoisted for the fleet to prepare for sailing; that the ships were getting under way; and that they expected to be out of Torbay next morning.

A deputation from the Senior and Junior Fellows of Trinity College, Dublin, has arrived in England, with a petition to his Majesty, that an alien may not be appointed to the Presidency of that College; and on Wednesday, Drs. Young and Hall waited on the Minister at his house in Downing street, and had a long conference on that subject.

DUKE OF YORK'S ARMY.

Head-quarters at Valenciennes,
October 15, at night.

The Duke of York this day removed his head quarters from Cisoing to this place; and the whole army has marched forwards, in order to join that of the Prince of Cobourg, which will be effected to-morrow.

We left in the camp near Cisoing, only two regiments of dragoons, which, under the orders of Sir William Erskine, are to follow us to-morrow. Before we left Cisoing yesterday morning, two French deserters of the 6th regiment of dragoons were brought in, who assured us, that the whole regiment would soon follow, and would have deserted long ago, but for a report spread through the whole army of the French, that all the French deserters were treated in the most cruel manner, by the Austrians and the English.

The French camp near Maubeuge is completely blocked up, as well as the fortress, and you may expect news of the greatest importance in the course of next week. We are happy to have brought the French into such a situation, that they cannot avoid a battle; and our whole army is in the highest spirits. When I say our whole army, I would not be understood to include the Dutch, two regiments of whom behaved a few days ago in the same manner as they did at Menin, and came no sooner within the sight of the French than they ran away. In order to break them to the fire, and teach them fighting, the Prince of Cobourg has placed them now in the first line, where, if necessary, the fire of the second will force them to keep their ground.

Since we left Menin, the French attempted an attack on that town, but finding it defended by brave Hanoverians, they soon gave up their attempt, and retired to their former position.

DUBLIN, Oct. 24.

Horses are purchasing for the cavalry in every part of Ireland with the utmost expedition, from which it should seem that there is little probability of peace being near at hand.

So crowded are the barracks with horses for foreign service, that the different privates in the cavalry have to take care of five or six horses each, notwithstanding the drafts which have recently been made for England.

Oliver, Esq; and by them secured in Kilsinnane Jail—the prisoners not having arrived at Bruff when the Alderman and his party went in, they proceeded for Kilsinnane, and escorted from thence nine Men, against whom there are positive informations for burning houses, &c. they were lodged in the County Jail on Wednesday evening.

Thursday morning the Troop of 14th Light Dragoons marched hence for Bandon.

Last Thursday, the Directors of St. Mary's Charity School, applied to the Earl of Burford to permit the Band of the 34th Regt. to perform the Charity Sermon on Sunday the 3d of November; the cheerfulness with which his Lordship politely assented, has deeply impressed the Directors with a sense of his Goodness.
