The house of Colonel Carey, in Marlborough street, who had retired to the country with his new married lady, has been robbed, it is supposed, by some tradesmen employed to put it in repair against the winter season.

Died, at the Hot Wells, Bristol, Edward King, Esq; Member of Parliament for the Borough of Carrick-on-Shannon.

BELFAST, Oct. 23]—The Turkish man and woman who have for some time past been in the house of the Sovereign, call themselves Abb de Rabman Rais and Sara his wife. They are dressed in the Turkish habit, and have the appearance and manners of persons bred in decent life. They report that he was a silk merchant in Tunis. That on their voyage in a Dutch vessel for Rotterdam in April last, with a valuable cargo of silks, the property of a house in which he was a partner, they were captured by a French privateer and taken into Dunkirk. From thence they were ordered to depart in three days, and having taken their passage in an American vessel bound for Liverpool, were advised there that many opportunities occur of ships from Cork for different ports in Barbary; and thus they account for their coming to Belfast in one of the lineo ships. They now only remain here for an opportunity of being taken back for Liverpool. Their passport is signed, "Le Baron de Fullade," a Commandant of the National Guard. It is extraordinary that the word "Baron" should have been used, since the abolition of titles of honour.

GALWAY, October 24. We are happy to hear that Lieutenant Malcolm of the 41st Regiment, who so spiritedly resigned his Adjutancy to go on foreign service, with the Grenadiers of that Regiment, is appointed by Sir Charles Gordon to the Adjutancy of the first Battalion of Grenadiers under his command, and Serjeant Beardsby, for whom, as a good drill, the Galway Militia offered an enormous sum for his discharge, is also appointed by Sir Charles Gordon, his Quarter-Master, to the said Battalion of Grenadiers.

The wooden Bridge at Waterford is nearly finished, and consists of 44 arches, with a Portcullis in the middle.
