The Turf Porters disappointed in their mal-practices at the Quay, are now busy in endeavouring to cast reflections on some of the Market Jurors, to whom the Public are greatly indebted, and particularly on a Mr. Ringrose, a gentleman of the most irreproachable character. Until this year all the Turf sold by the kish and bag was of the worst quality, but now the Mayor prevails on the Market Jury to buy the best turf and cause it to be retailed; the price must of course be considerably higher by the kish and bag, but the solid good quality of the Turf, makes amends in a three or four-fold proportion.—The turf porters buy bad turf, and their plan is to obtain the same price as is fixed for the best; the Mayor and Market Jury are determined to prevent this, and punish these men for extortion. The public on a cool investigation of this subject will easily account for any malicious report.
