At a meeting of the Committee for the establishment of a SCHOOL of INDUSTRY, and USEFUL LEARNING, in the CITY of LIMERICK.

IT being a most desirable thing that the youth of both sexes of the lower class, should be brought up in good principles, inured to habits of industry, and instructed in useful occupations, it is proposed to establish a School, wherein a system of education shall be pursued adapted to produce those beneficial effects. A principal advantage to be derived from the employment of Children is the preventing their becoming a prey to an habitual idleness, with its train of pernicious consequences, and their establishment in the contrary habits of industry, sobriety, and peaceable demeanour. A plan for the government and direction of the School, so as to facilitate the execution of the Design, will be submitted to the Subscribers; a general meeting of whom will be requested, to settle every thing relating to the Charity, on the most approved and permanent foundation, and to appoint a Committee to carry it into execution. Mean-time, for the information of the public, the following heads of the plan will be laid before them, —

The School to be supported by Donations and annual Subscriptions; without application at places of religious worship, or of public amusement.

As many boys and girls to be admitted as the Governors shall deem the fund adequate to support according to the intent of the Institution, who shall be taught reading and writing, and employed in knitting, spinning, and such other branches of industry as shall be deemed suitable, and most likely to prove of utility to themselves.

When sufficiently instructed in these particulars, it is proposed that they shall be apprenticed out to such trades and employments as to the Governors shall seem proper: A preference being given to those whose behaviour and acquirements at School shall entitle them to such mark of distinction.

No objection to be made to the admission of any Children on account of their Religion, nor are they to be instructed in the School in the tenets of any particular persuasion, but all may enjoy their own religious opinions, go to their respective places of worship, and attend to the instruction of their several Pastors. — When the Children are capable, it is intended that they shall read a portion of the Holy Scriptures daily, together with such plain moral tracts, setting forth their duty and obligations as members of society, as to the
