manners or the people, things, which it is the interest of every nation, and should be the object of every friend to his country, to promote. There are perhaps no means more likely to forward theat ainment of this defireable end, than fuch as tend, to imprefs upon the minds of the rifing generation, fentiments of virtue, and to fecure them from the fatal delutions of vice, (to which the idle are peculiarly exposed) by bringing them up in babits of Industry, and enabling them to carn their bread by honest and ufeful occupations. The fweets of labour, need but to be known to be relished ; and there is but little danger that the man who is able, and accustomed, to produce a livelihood by working with his hands, will have recourse to violence and wrong for his support - It is with great satisfaction therefore that we see a School about to be established in this City, for the purpole of instructing in their duty as Members of Society, the south of the lower class, and promoting industrious babits among them. We cannot but expels our wifnes that it may experience that corouragement and affiltance, from the upper ranks, which an inflitution of this nature fo well deferves, and which, indeed, it is their interest, no less than their duty, to afford it. The liberal and fentible principles on which it is propoled to establish it, are such as must give universal fatisfaction, and will, we truft, unite all religious persuafions in its support.

With pleasure do we anticipate the day when its happy effects thall have become evident in the increased tranquility, and good order of our City, and the diminution of Criminals in our Jails.—Wife is the policy, which promotes the public good, more by the prevention, than

the punishment, of crimes.

The public are much indebted to the Rev. Doctor Manufell, for his discovery of raising Potatoes from the shoots, his reducing that mode to a certain and unersing lystem, and his indefatigable industry, in diffeminating his difcovery through the kingdom .- A few days ago. Henry D'Efterre, Efq; our Chief Magiftrate, the Hon. and Rev. Dean Crosbie, Ben. Frend, Richard Harte, and Samuel Dickson, Esquis. with leveral others, went to his potatoe garden, to fee his drill tillage from the shoots dug; to their great furprize they found them the fineft and largest potatoes they ever faw, much superior, and more in number than those fown from the real potatoe; -this Gentleman, to ferve the tenantry of this kingdom, and to give them food at a cheap rate, addressed the Dublin Society last fpring, with his treatife on the culture from the shoots, a part of which was only published; we are informed, and are happy to hear, that he has a fecond treatife on the culture of that mod necessary article of life preparing, to lay before the Dublin Society; it is much to be wished, that so useful a discovery may be generally known, as it will be an amazing faving to the poor of this kingdom, in that most necessary article of life, and that the Dublin Society will have both treatifes published, when the second is laid before them.
