The sweets of labour, need but to be known to be relished; and there is but little danger that the man who is able, and accustomed, to procure a livelihood by working with his hands, will have recourse to violence and wrong for his support.—It is with great satisfaction therefore that we see a School about to be established in this City, for the purpose of instructing in their duty as Members of Society, the youth of the lower class, and promoting industrious habits among them. We cannot but express our wishes that it may experience that encouragement and assistance, from the upper ranks, which an institution of this nature so well deserves, and which, indeed, it is their interest, no less than their duty, to afford it. The liberal and sensible principles on which it is proposed to establish it, are such as must give universal satisfaction, and will, we trust, unite all religious persuasions in its support.

With pleasure do we anticipate the day when its happy effects shall have become evident in the increased tranquility, and good order of our City, and the diminution of Criminals in our Jails.—Wise is the policy, which promotes the public good, more by the prevention, than the punishment, of crimes.

The public are much indebted to the Rev. Doctor Maunfell, for his discovery of raising Potatoes from the shoots, his reducing that mode to a certain and unerring system, and his indefatigable industry, in disseminating his discovery through the kingdom.—A few days ago, Henry D'Este, Esq; our Chief Magistrate, the Hon. and Rev. Dean Crosbie, Ben. Friend, Richard Harte, and Samuel Dickson, Esqrs. with several others, went to his potatoe garden, to see his drill tillage from the shoots dug; to their great surprize they found them the finest and largest potatoes they ever saw, much superior, and more in number than those sown from the real potatoe;—this Gentleman, to serve the tenantry of this kingdom, and to give them food at a cheap rate, addressed the Dublin Society last spring, with his treatise on the culture from the shoots, a part of which was only published; we are informed, and are happy to hear, that he has a second treatise on the culture of that most necessary article of life preparing, to lay before the Dublin Society; it is much to be wished, that so useful a discovery may be generally known, as it will be an amazing saving to the poor of this kingdom, in that most necessary article of life, and that the Dublin Society will have both treatises published, when the second is laid before them.
