Last night Mr. Millward, goaler, discovered that the noted Laurence Sizs, (whose committal appeared in a former paper,) had found means to procure a slit-saw, with which he cut off his Bolts; he secured him in the Dungeon.

This morning Mr. Philip Russell, our vigilant Clerk of the Market, seized a number of Turkeys, also nine quarters of Mutton, all of which were deceitfully dressed and blown;—part were sent to the House of Industry, remainder distributed among proper objects.
