Yesterday morning the King attended pray-  
 ers in the private Chapel of Windsor. At  
 eleven o'clock his Majesty set off for St.  
 James's Palace, where he arrived before one

Another Proclamation was yesterday issued  
 for a General Fast to be observed in Scotland,  
 on Thursday the 27<sup>th</sup> day of February next.

After the levee Ibrahim Ismael, (Reis Effendi  
 at the Court of his Sublime Highness the Em-  
 peror of Turkey) attended by his Faquier (or  
 secretary, and his Dragoman or interpreter,)  
 had an audience of the King in the cloister, to  
 to deliver his credentials; to which he was in-  
 troduced by Lord Grenville, and conducted by  
 Sir C. Dormer, Knt. Master of the Ceremo-  
 nies. The Envoy and his two attendants were  
 habited in a manner remarkably plain, to the
