"During the time Capt. Giles was on board the Fraternite, the Captain of her said, he was to cruise from the Lizard half way across the Channel, and that his consort, another frigate, was to cruise from Scilly to Ushant; that they had sailed from Brest the 25th inst. with a third frigate, whose station he did not mention, that their cruise was to be for 30 days; and that there are at present ten different French men of war cruising in the channel. The Captain of the Fraternite further said, that he stood so near to Falmouth harbour as to see the lights on board the ships there; that his orders were to look into Plymouth, and in case he perceived any considerable English fleet about to sail to the westward, to return with all speed to Brest, where there was a large fleet ready to put to sea."

Another message was sent off yesterday morning, with instructions to Admiral Bowyer, whose force is, it is said, to be made equal to that in Brest water, which consisted, according to the last intelligence received by the Kite cutter, of about ten sail of the line, besides frigates, &c.

From Paris we learn, that the Brest Fleet was to be ready to put to sea with the first fair wind after the 5th instant. On Saturday last, for the first time for two or three weeks past, the wind came to the eastward—the probability is, that the enemy would avail themselves of the opportunity, and are now at sea. The precise number of ships of the line composing the French Fleet, is not at present clearly ascertained.

Intelligence was received yesterday that the French at Toulon were making unparalleled exertions in equipping their ships. Thirteen sail of the line are nearly ready for sea, and the greatest encouragement offered to seamen. The shipwrights, &c. who were resident there during the time Toulon was in possession of the Allies, were dismissed as suspicious persons, and an amazing number are sent thither from every part of France, who receive six livres a day for their labour.

Yesterday Mr. Mason, a Messenger, arrived at the Secretary of State's office with dispatches from his Royal Highness the Duke of York. No event of any importance has taken place in Flanders.

The three fleets which sailed from Portsmouth on Sunday morning last, are returned to Torbay, having been forced in there by contrary winds. Had those ships proceeded on their voyage, many of them would, in all probability, have fallen into the enemy's hands, as several large French ships are known to be cruising in the channel.

The Culloden, lately arrived at Spithead from Cadiz, has brought over 110,000 in dollars. The Spaniards had at Cadiz 20 sail of the line, 2 of fifty guns—3 frigates—3 sloops and two brigs, all nearly ready for sea.

The Kitty, Transport, just arrived from Botany Bay at Portsmouth, brings the most pleasing news from that island.
