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have sailed from different ports in the Baltic for French ports, and 138 of them have arrived safe. The French pay for the cargoes when the ships fail, and give a premium to the Captains when they arrive.

On the arrival of Sir John Jervis at Barbadoes, he found near 400 Republican Frenchmen, chiefly captured at Tobago, to whom handsome terms were offered provided they would embark on the intended expedition; but resolutely refusing, a transport was provided with proper few stores and a guard, the whole of the Republicans put on board, and conveyed by the Rose frigate to a certain latitude, where they were left to shape their course whithersoever they pleased.

Of the late conspiracy to deliver up Luxembourg to the French, the following are now circulated as some of the particulars:—A Captain of Hossars, being on reconnoitre, met with a cart passing the frontier, laden with sugar, coffee, and tea; the cartter had a passport from General Schroedor, the Commander at Luxembourg, for a village on the Frontier. The Captain did not dispute the passport, but ordered his men to examine the merchandize, to see if it was such as the passport represented. Afterwards, they examined the cartter himself, and found under his shirt papers of a treasonable nature. He was led back to Luxembourg; and immediately a Captain of the corps of Miners shot himself. As to General Schroedor himself, no one knows what has become of him. Some imagine him confined; others, executed. A perfect secrecy is kept up respecting his fate; but General Latour commands, in his place, till the arrival of General Molel.

It has been remarked, that the names of Robespierre and Danton have not lately appeared in the reports of proceedings in the Convention or the Clubs. These men seldom come forward in either, but on important and urgent occasions. Their silence may in general be considered as a proof that the operations, of which they are the chief directors, are going on smoothly.

Mr. Gerald, on his late visit at Edinburgh, spoke for three hours and a half, with great animation and power, and without interruption, except for a few minutes, during which he took refreshment.

DUBLIN, March 24.

Yesterday a messenger arrived at the Secretary's office in the Castle, with the bills which are to receive the royal assent to-morrow.

His Excellency the Lord Lieutenant will go in state to-morrow to the House of Peers, and give the royal assent to the several bills passed during the present sessions of Parliament.

Yesterday two regiments of English recruits arrived in this city, and took up their quarters in the barracks.—Some newly raised Scotch regiments are expected to arrive shortly in this kingdom, to make room for whom the new regiments raising in this kingdom, as well as some of the old military establishment, are to be partly sent into Great Britain, and partly to the Continents.
