They shall not be forced to serve; and those who shall refuse to enlist shall be transported to Europe at a convenient opportunity.—A. Granted.—V. The Malays shall be well treated, and shall not be forced to serve either as soldiers or sailors.—A. Granted.—VI. The Storekeeper, his Assistant, and Secretary, demand permission to remain here.—A. These gentlemen will be allowed a reasonable time for the arrangement of their affairs, but are to be considered as prisoners of war.—VII. All the articles of the capitulation of Trincomale, although not contained in this capitulation, shall be also extended to the garrison of Oostenburgh, as far as they shall apply.—Granted.—VIII. At four o'clock this afternoon the garrison shall march out, drums beating, and the troops shall lay down their arms.—A. The garrison will march out at four o'clock this afternoon, in the manner required by this article; but a detachment of the British Army must be put in possession of the Water Gate at 2 o'clock this afternoon, and proper persons will be appointed by Capt. Hoffmann to point out the magazines, that guards may be posted for their security.—IX. All the ammunition, magazines, papers, and public property shall be delivered to a Commissioner named on the part of his Britannic Majesty.
