The following estimates for one year, to the 1st of March 1797, were ordered to be laid before the House: of the army within this kingdom, of the army serving abroad, of the augmentations to the army, of additional pay, of additional officers, of additional general officers, of additional aides-de-camp, of additional Musters, of additional Master General, of Government, of garrisons, of recruiting, of half pay, of pensions to widows of officers, of ordnance, of contingencies, of Royal Hospital, of Royal Artillery, of militia, of militia contingencies, of buildings, of associate and assistant Judges, of satisfaction for Chief Remembrancer, Solicitor General, of practice in Dublin port, of wages, stationary, &c. for public offices, of proclamations, of apprehending offenders, of allowances to officers in England and Ireland for services this session, &c. of printing Stationery for Parliament, and of clothing for the army and navy.

Ordered, on the motion of Sir James Cotter, that the Speaker do issue his warrant to the clerk of the peace, to make out a new writ for electors to serve in this present Parliament, in the borough of Castlemartyr, in the county of Wick, in the room of Sir Nicholas Conway, who is deceased.
