Mr. Wynne declared, that the conduct of Lord Carhampton had faved the county he relided in ; the Magistrates who had acted with him had, in their endeavour for the public good transgressed the forms of law, and looked to the House for in-

Mr. Sandford faid the conduct of the Noble Lord had been the falvation of the county Rofcommon: The Magistrates had, under his example exerted themselves in a manner absolutely

requifite for public fafety.

Mr. Egan thought that as an honelt man, after the unanimous declaration of the country gentlemen on the subject of this bill, he could not avoid voting against his Right Hon. Friend

Mr. Fletcher, after what he had heard from the unanimous tellimony of the country gentlemen, was convinced of the necessity of the bill.

The speakers for the motion of Mr. Grattan were Mr. Jephlon, Sir Laurence Parlons, Mr. G. Ponfonby, Mr. Curvan, and Lord Edward Firzgerald.

Mr. Grattan concluded the debate by a reply to the speakers against his motion, urging the necessity of a solemn inquiry, in order to warrant

trong a measure.

But the Attorney General, having moved the order of the day for the second reading of the Indemnity Bill, it was put and carried, without a division; it was then read a fecond time, and committed for to-morrow.

A gentleman who left London on Thursday last, fays, that at the court end of the town it was confidently reported on that day, that steps had actually been taken by the British agent at Balle, to open a pacific negociation on ground more practicable than a general flatus quo.
