

Mr. Wrenley, although the County he represented was free from disturbance, could not avoid agreeing in the necessity of the bill.

Mr. Wynne declared, that the conduct of Lord Carhampton had saved the County he resided in; the Magistrates who had acted with him had, in their endeavour for the public good transgressed the forms of law, and looked to the House for indemnity.

Mr. Sandford said the conduct of the Noble Lord had been the salvation of the County Roscommon: The Magistrates had, under his example exerted themselves in a manner absolutely requisite for public safety.

Mr. Egan thought that as an honest man, after the unanimous declaration of the County gentlemen on the subject of this bill, he could not avoid voting against his Right Hon. Friend.

Mr. Fletcher, after what he had heard from the unanimous testimony of the County gentlemen, was convinced of the necessity of the bill.

The speakers for the motion of Mr. Grattan were Mr. Jephson, Sir Laurence Parsons, Mr. G. Ponsonby, Mr. Curran, and Lord Edward Fitzgerald.

Mr. Grattan concluded the debate by a reply to the speakers against his motion, urging the necessity of a solemn inquiry, in order to warrant a strong measure.

But the Attorney General, having moved the order of the day for the second reading of the Indemnity Bill, it was put and carried, without a division; it was then read a second time, and committed for to-morrow.

A gentleman who left London on Thursday last, says, that at the court end of the town it was confidently reported on that day, that steps had actually been taken by the British agent at Basle, to open a pacific negotiation on ground more practicable than a general *status quo*.
