

Letter from Franckfort, Jan. 9. Many papers state, that a Prussian Army is marching against Holland, to be the reigning Duke of Brunswick. The French Government will not touch, on various pretences more or less. We do not know what degree of credit this important intelligence: it is, however, that the present occupation of the provinces on the left bank of the Rhine, must have led to particular regulations, the effect of which must be very great. It is very natural to suppose these stipulations Holland is in some danger.

The Lieutenant and Council have by a Proclamation forbidden the exportation of corn, flour, bread, biscuit, and potatoes, from the ports of this kingdom, save such quantities as shall be necessary for the shipping which shall be bound to the kingdom, for provisions for the crew and other persons on board such ships, and their respective voyages. The Council in Jamaica down to the 10th of February have come to hand by the late West India Ship, that they contain disagreeable accounts of a total interruption of the trade to the island by the incredible number of privateers with which it is on every side surrounded, the great scarcity of provisions, and the dearth of the great commodity, and the anxiety of the arrival of the grand fleet under the command of Admiral Christian was expected. The price of sugar up to the enormous price of fifteen shillings the barrel, and all other provisions in proportion. They add, that their provisions would be much greater but for the arrival of a few large vessels from the American States who are permitted to trade in their ports during the war.

The letter confirms the arrival of a French frigate at St. Domingo, with a crew of 1000 men and a body of land forces, who have taken possession of the Spanish dependencies in the name of the French Republic. There were received in town yesterday from the French Consul, dated Dec. 22, 1795, containing the French having undertaken a expedition to Africa, and burnt or taken several English vessels on that coast.

Several troops entered Warsaw on the 25th of January, and took possession of the city.—The army consisted of four regiments of infantry, two regiments of cavalry, and some divisions of artillery.
