

The Court Martial which has been sitting for the last three weeks, at Sheerneck, on the mutineers of the *Defiance* man of war terminated on Thursday, when of the seventeen unfortunate men, nine were ordered to be hanged, six to receive corporal punishment, and two were acquitted.

It was the ship *Diligent*, Capt. Taylor, that spoke with 29 of the outward-bound West India convoy, in lat. 41. 20. long. 18. 50. all well.

Thursday evening a lighter, in which were four men bringing up to this City a quantity of corn and beans from Newtown, was upset by a sudden squall of wind, by which unfortunate accident Timothy M'Nemara, a stout young fellow, who could swim remarkably well, was drowned,—the three other men were taken up, but one of them it is thought, cannot recover.

The account inserted in a former Chronicle, of Colonel Sir Vere Hunt, Bart. having received His Majesty's letters of service for raising another Regiment of Infantry—is confirmed; and we hear that Captain O'Dwyer is appointed Major, with beating-orders to raise a Battalion, which we doubt not will be rapidly completed, from the liberal and fair manner that he has always recruited.
